Re: Award Resolution for Iowa Emergency Solutions Grant

**The ESG program:** IFA administers the statewide allocation of funds for the federal Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program, which helps individuals and families experiencing a housing crisis to be quickly rehoused and stabilized. It provides support for Street Outreach, Shelter, Homelessness Prevention, and Rapid Rehousing (rental assistance paired with case management and supportive services). IFA projects \$3,055,467 in federal appropriated funding available for recipients under the ESG program for 2024.

**Competition for funds:** IFA conducted a two-year ESG competition for funds in the summer of 2023. Twenty-nine applications for ESG were received and reviewed by a panel of reviewers convened by IFA. Agencies were eligible to apply for up to \$50,000 in Street Outreach assistance. Agencies were also eligible to apply for funding to provide Rapid Rehousing and/or Homelessness Prevention on a regional basis, through a network of 17 Coordinated Services/Coordinated Entry Regions for homelessness services across the state. Eligible regional amounts were designated ahead of time, based on data provided by our partner, the Institute for Community Alliances, on needs and historical predictors of homelessness in each county. Agencies in some regions coordinated their applications together based on which applicants were best suited to provide Rapid Rehousing and/or Homelessness Prevention for designated counties or subpopulations. In other regions, multiple agencies applied to provide the same services, and reviewers weighed the application scores and plans for each region to develop recommended awards.

**<u>Award recommendations</u>**: Of the twenty-nine applicants, twenty-seven are recommended for funding in at least one category. Recommended awards Street Outreach assistance are based on score, adjusted for the total amount available. Recommended awards for Rapid Rehousing and Homelessness Prevention assistance are based on the designated regional amount and recommended regional plan. Two applicants did not meet threshold, either due to a low score, or not meeting program requirements. This leaves ESG funding available for 27 awards for Street Outreach assistance and regional Rapid Rehousing and/or Homelessness Prevention.

**<u>Requested resolution</u>**: This requested resolution is to authorize the award of ESG funds to the 27 agencies in the attached document, ESG Proposed Awards for the 2024 Calendar Year.

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## RESOLUTION HI23-15

WHEREAS, the Iowa Finance Authority (the "Authority"), in accordance with the statutory directives set forth in Chapter 16 of the Code of Iowa, as amended, works to expand, protect, and preserve affordable housing for low and moderate income families in the State of Iowa; and

WHEREAS, the Authority administers the Iowa Emergency Solutions Grant ("ESG"); and

WHEREAS, the Authority has received applications for funds from 29 nonprofit organizations or local governments seeking assistance who have been determined by the Authority staff to be eligible recipients ("Applicants") for funding from the ESG program; and

WHEREAS, the Authority projects \$3,055,467 in federal appropriated funding available for recipients under the ESG program, to be used for the 2024 calendar year; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to chapters 41 and 42 of its administrative rules, the Authority has appointed a panel to review the applications and this panel has made recommendations to award ESG funding to 27 of the Applicants, and has also made recommendations on the appropriate amount of funding to be awarded to each Applicant.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of the Iowa Finance Authority as follows:

SECTION 1. Pursuant to chapter 42 of its administrative rules, the Board hereby authorizes the award of approximately \$3,055,467, subject to final verification by Authority staff, in total funding for awards under the ESG program for the 2024 calendar year.

SECTION 3. The Board hereby authorizes the award of grant funds, subject to final verification by Authority staff, to the Applicants as listed by the attached Proposed Iowa Emergency Solutions Grant & Shelter Assistance Fund Awards for the 2024 Calendar Year.

Re: Award Resolution for Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS

**The HOPWA program:** IFA administers the statewide allocation of funds for the federal Housing Opportunities for Persons with Aids (HOPWA) program, which assists persons who have been diagnosed with HIV/AIDS and their families who are homeless or at-risk of homelessness. It provides support for rent, utility, and mortgage assistance (rental assistance paired with case management and supportive services). IFA projects \$982,843.81 in federal appropriated funding available for sponsors under the HOPWA program for 2024.

**Formula for sponsors:** IFA completed the 2024 HOPWA sponsor allocation based off data from the Iowa Department of Public Health 2021 HIV and Aids End of Year Surveillance Report. Five sponsors were determined eligible for HOPWA funding based off the HIV/AIDS cases by county and the Iowa HOPWA Sponsor Map to ensure all counties are covered.

Award recommendations: All five sponsors are recommended for continued HOPWA funding.

**<u>Requested resolution</u>**: This requested resolution is to authorize the award of HOPWA funds to the 5 sponsors in the attached document, HOPWA 2024 Proposed Sponsor Funding Allocations.

## RESOLUTION HI23-18

WHEREAS, the Iowa Finance Authority (the "Authority"), in accordance with the statutory directives set forth in Chapter 16 of the Code of Iowa, as amended, works to expand, protect, and preserve affordable housing for low and moderate income families in the State of Iowa; and

WHEREAS, the Authority administers the Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS ("HOPWA"); and

WHEREAS, the Authority projects \$982,843.81 in federal appropriated funding available for recipients under the HOPWA program, to be used for the 2024 calendar year; and

SECTION 2. The Board hereby authorizes the award of grant funds, subject to final verification by Authority staff, to the Applicants as listed by the attached Proposed Iowa HOPWA 2024 Proposed Sponsor Funding Allocations.
